1. "How is the Lord with me?"

Asked by Gideon:

"O my lord, if the LORD is with us, why then has all this happened to us?" (Judges 6:13)

The same meaning by Martha:
"Lord, if You had been here, my
brother would not have died"
(John 11:21)



2. "Do I have to?" (1)

- God's plans always include man to bring healing, deliverance, and salvation.
- The Passover Lamb
- The healing of Hezekiah: "Now Isaiah had said, 'Let them take a lump of figs, and apply it as a poultice on the boil, and he shall recover." (Isaiah 38:21)



2. "Do I have to?" (2)

- The healing of Naaman the Syrian
- The man born blind
- Moving the stone from Lazarus' tomb
- Feeding the multitude with the five loves and two fish



3. "Why me?"

Between the temptation of pride (Israel) and the grumbling against the task ("O my Lord, please send by the hand of whomever else You may send." -- Exodus 4:13), many fall away.

4. "What is in it for me?"

- The Lord Jesus and His mother taught us by example the selfless service.
- The service of the Pharisees,
 Ananias and Sapphira, and
 Simon the sorcerer are
 examples of serving for a
 dishonest gain.



5. "Then what?"

- Those who work with God know that He does not reveal all of His plans at once.
- The examples of Abraham,
 Joseph, Moses, and Elijah



6. "What about...?"

- These are the questions about convenience and conditions
- A true servant is only mindful of his/her duties and obligations
