- "Peter was therefore kept in prison, but constant prayer was offered to God for him by the church." (Acts 12:5)


1. The gathering of the people

- EX: Poor Widow
- "Assuredly, I say to you that this poor widow has put in more than all those who have given to the treasury..." (Mk. 12:43)






3. The Blessing is from the Lord

- The blessing of the Eucharist is transformative
- "So then neither he who plants is anything, nor he who waters, but God who gives the increase. Now he who plants and he who waters are one, and each one will receive his own reward according to his own labor." (1 Cor. 3:7-8)

4. The meal is to be distributed by the disciples


